

Students try to sensitise public on environment with murals

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For that, enough rainfall is needed. And the number of trees play a key role in getting adequate rainfall. Everything is inter-connected. Students say that the murals have been inspired by the paintings of a Bengali artist. "We've taken inspiration from the paintings of Jamini Roy. And we've predominantly used primary Indian colours — yellow, blue and red," says Pearl Maxy, a Fine Arts student and adds that the murals will be an eye catcher once it is completed fully. "A lot of motorists commute on this road — Cathedral Road. Especially, when they stop at the signal, the murals will definitely catch their attention."

Dr Margaret Thomas, a faculty member and PG Head, sums up saying that the recent environmental issues that Chennai faced — 2015 flood and recent ones like the flood and oil spill — triggered the thought to do this project. "The primary idea is to sensitise people. The last time we did murals on the wall was couple of years ago for another project called Art Chennai.
